We were very busy with breakfast and lunch meetings with mining companies such as New Age Metals, Conquest Resources, Inventus, Granada Gold and Seal River Exploration. Other companies we networked with and currently have projects on nDaki Menan that are either planned or underway are Gamet Gold, Canadian Goldminer and iMetals. All of the companies we dealt with all seek to build a good working relationship with Temagami First Nation by letting us know what work is proposed and future plans.

We noticed a “buzz” and a lot of positive excitement at the convention this year as the industry seems to be gaining momentum and is in general on an upturn. We met with Ontario government ministers Michael Gravelle MNDM and Nathalie De Rosiers MNRF and Doug even met Premier Wynne for a photo. It is a small world because we ran into Anthony Rota, John Vanthof and Charlie Angus at networking events. We met up with many colleagues and peers from the government agencies

# RENEWABLE ENERGY FIELD TRIP

Hello all,

Hope every one has had a wonderful March, I know I have enjoyed the ice road staying in throughout the whole month. On February 26<sup>th</sup> it was a chilly and sunny day, and the Grade 7 and 8 class from the Laura McKenzie Learning Center had the opportunity to go on a *renewable energy field trip*. On the trip they toured a solar installation on a rooftop right in the community, got a tour inside the Hound Chutes Hydro Electric Dam in Cobalt, and also saw the Canadian Solar facility outside of New Liskeard. The first stop of the day was at a community members house on the island; at this solar installation they learned all the mechanisms revolving around how a rooftop solar installation works from the collection of the suns energy to how the home owner benefits from this process.

At the Hound Chutes Hydro Electric Dam the stu-

dents had a full tour of the facility and how the dam operates. They also saw all of the mechanical equipment along with how it works and a lesson on how the structure is one of a kind in Ontario—a run of the river hydro electric dam.

The last stop was the Canadian Solar installation in New Liskeard. At this location the students learned the ins and outs of large solar installations, from how they collect the sun, the different types of solar panels, to how the energy is converted to be able to be transmitted to our homes from the solar field. During this visit they also got to see a solar field close up and how each step they learned from the in-class session was done through each mechanism they saw.

## DOUG McKENZIE Retires from TFN

Doug began fulltime work for TFN in 1976, training as community planner and worked on the development of a comprehensive community plan under the tutelage of Peter Ma of INAC. This plan led to surveying the lots on Bear Island according to location of houses.

First elected to Council on or about 1976 and participated in development of the Teme-

Augama Anishnabai  
(Temagami Indian Band)

Constitution, which was enacted in 1978. At that time Doug became the Second Chief of TFN.

In 1978 the Bear Island case began in Supreme Court of Ontario and it became full time work for Chief Potts. Doug became the Band Manager, the first time this job became separated from the Chief's office. The Economic Development Officer position was added to his responsibilities.

On or about 1980 the Band gained ownership of the old Hudson Bay property. As the Economic Development Officer, Doug applied for funding to renovate and reopen the store under the name of the Bear Island Trading Post, the project was more than \$500K in funding. The labour was paid through a section 25 project, which included renovating the store, the boathouse, dock and boardwalk. The project was considered quite successful and presented at LEAP conferences as an example.

In and around 1980 as the reserve manager Doug convinced the administrator Linda George of the

need to adapt to computers, this was a big change as Linda did not trust computers. Also around this time the NAADP program came out. Doug wrote a proposal on the premise that someone would benefit from a full time job he says he was not aware of the serious impact of alcoholism in the community. Over the years since, there has

been a big change in the community attitude toward alcohol.

Also during this period Doug was instrumental in increasing the size of the ball-field and getting a rink built. As manager of the old timers ball team Doug along with assistant Greg Turner organized some good old time ball tournaments.

In March of 1990, the MOU was signed, which set up the Wendaban Stewardship, the By-lateral forestry process and settlement negotiations. Doug took on the role of director of negotiations, and the first thing required was to set up office space. With the

support of council Doug negotiated the purchase of Manito. As a negotiator Doug was directly involved in the AIP negotiated and put before the community for ratification in the fall of 1993. In the fall of 1994 Gary Potts decided he would not run, in a close election Doug was elected Chief of the Teme-Augama Anishnabai and held that office for three terms. There was no funding in place, so he assumed the role of administration of TAA as well. The TAA under his leadership had



Assemblies over at Shiningwood Bay. The meeting site was constructed by volunteers.

In 1996 Doug took on the role as the Project Manager to develop Central Water and Sewage for the Bear Island community, which had been identified in the 1993 Capital Management plan. The project including design and construction cost \$5.6 million and came in \$40k under budget. After the water and sewage project Doug worked as Forestry Liaison for about 2 years and negotiation started up again. Doug took on the roll of Negotiator Director again, which he did until he took on the position as Health Services Manager. He held this position for about a year or so and was shifted to Public Works Manager when Holly came back to work.

As the Public Works Manager, Doug negotiated for funding to construct the extension of road, water and sewage to the subdivision behind Joe Katt's. Doug applied for funding to install garbage compactors at a cost of \$250k, these compactors greatly reduce the cost of hauling garbage, plus the funding paid for a new truck. In

the public works position Doug also applied for and received \$500k funding for the road extension and improvements including building the TFN parking lot at the Access Road. This funding helped pay for the cost of a new barge and loader back hoe. While working as the Public Works Manager Doug discovered that the funding left over from the sewer and water project was still in the bank along with interest earned, he obtained permission from INAC to use the funds to add an office onto the water plant .

Doug moved from Public Works to his present position as Resource Development Advisor 5 years ago. While it seems like nothing is happening, Temagami First Nation is building positive relationships within the mining industry, who now know we are here!

Doug was elected back on council at the last election, and while retiring from work will remain involved in the community.

Thank you Doug ... we'll miss you around here!

Please be aware that the Ontario Arts Council offers a grant relating to Indigenous Culture of up to **\$5000.00** known as the **Indigenous Culture Fund Small Grant**.

First-time applicants, youth and elders are all encouraged to apply for these with proposed short-term community, culture and way-of-life projects.

Applications are reviewed with a quick turnaround time. Ontario-based Indigenous organizations, groups and individuals are eligible.

There are five funding categories:

1) **Community/Culture/Way of Life: for projects, events or activities**

**Examples:**

**Organizing a cultural camp where Elders, language speakers and knowledge keepers take youth out on the land and share their teachings.**

**Hosting a gathering where traditional medicines and harvesting teachings are shared with community members.**

2) **Indigenous Language Projects**

**Examples:**

**Running Indigenous language immersion classes in the community.**

**Participating in an Indigenous workshop, program or class as an individual learner.**

3) **Cultural Research, Documentation, Tools and Resources**

**Examples:**

**Developing a protocols tool-kit that will support archaeological digs in the community.**

**Researching and documenting stories about the local community and land to share with future generations.**

4) **Cultural Mentorship or Learning**

**Examples:**

**A master birch bark canoe maker mentors an emerging maker on traditional techniques for a period of time.**

**A community group offers family and all-ages drumming workshops.**

5) Travel related expenses to attend and/or participate in community or cultural activities, events, workshops or conferences which are typically unavailable in your community.

3) How will this project create opportunities for Indigenous participant(s) to engage in, learn and share their cultural practices and expand their traditional knowledge? What are the long-term impacts on the participant(s) and/or their community as a result of participation? (500 words maximum)



# Temagami Island Tour of the Old Growth Forest with University of Toronto

On Sunday March 25<sup>th</sup>, 2018 myself along with Alex Paul Sr. had the opportunity to guide students from the University of Toronto on a snowshoe trip around the Temagami Islands Old Growth Forest Trails with a professor and roughly 25 students from the Masters of Landscape




Architecture program. The students were focusing on the way the landscape can have effects on the old growth forest and since most of them have never seen an old growth red and white pine forest they wanted to view its type of landscape. We started our day by walking from the Mine Landing to the East Dock entrance to the Temagami Island Trails, from there we continued on to the south entrance on the old growth trail. Once on the

trail the students had the opportunity to experience old growth red and white pine along with the landscape of the island. Myself along with Alex Paul Sr. spoke about:

- the history of the Island and trail systems,
- some history of the Temagami First Nation/ Teme- Augama Anishnabai,
- the age of the old growth trees,
- how the drainage and landscape can alter the size of the trees,
- the special importance of having old growth in an ecosystem,
- and tree tags on the old growth trees.

Throughout the session Alex and myself answered many questions in regards to the science of an old growth forest, traditions of the Temagami First Nation/ Teme-Augama Anishnabai, medicinal plants, to even questions about animal tracks viewed at the site. After the Temagami Island Old Growth site visit the students went to the Temagami Theatre to watch and have questions about Makwa Jiimaan - Deep Water Deep Roots, presented by Robin Potts. They had a presentation involving the geological history of Temagami presented by Marvyn Morrison, along with a presentation on Temagami First Nation history, politics, N'daki Menan and much more presented by Mary Laronde.

Students should also keep in mind the deadline date of August 31<sup>st</sup> 2018 for the **Education Incentive Policy**. Any **Education Incentive** applications received after this date will not be considered.

The **Elders and Disabled Home Repairs** program is available for disabled band members and band members who are 50 years of age as of March 31, 2019. Members who own their own home and whose household income is below \$40,000 or single income is below \$28,000 are eligible to re-apply every 5 years. Please submit a letter with documentation to the Community Infrastructure Manager by April 30, 2018. For information regarding RRAP, Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program, please contact the band office at the above number.

# Summary of the Mining Information Session held on March 20, 2018

The Community Mining Information Session held on March 20 was well attended by community members. 25-30 community members attended the afternoon session as we heard updates and introductions from four mining companies working on nDaki Menan and also updates from the Ministry of Northern Development and Mines (MNDM). Chii-



miigwich to community members who took the time to come out and participate. The Community Mining Information Session provided the opportunity to community members to hear presentations and ask questions directly to mining exploration proponents with projects on nDaki Menan.

## Summary of Presentations

**Alamos** – Luc Guimond – Mine Manager gave everyone a rundown on the timelines associated with the ongoing infrastructure construction as the Young Davidson Mine continues to ramp up to full production. The modification of the water treatment facility and tailings impoundment area was explained in addition to deepening of the Northgate shaft and installing an underground maintenance shop. Luc and Paul Cote explained that they take safety very seriously at the mine and are now 2.9 million man hours without a lost time accident. Luc sounded pleased with their progress at the mine.

**East Copperfields** – Dan Hachey – President and CEO shared an overview of the company's intentions in regard to gold and copper exploration work that is located mostly northeast of the old Copperfields or Temagami Mine and towards Ship Island and the mine road. They outlined a proposed geophysical survey on the ground and over lake to look for drill targets. With some success in finding targets they plan to drill prospective areas. There was an airborne VTEM survey done as well. This survey took readings of the magnetic field and measured how well the ground will let electricity travel through it. They flew 650 km of lines covering their claims and the mine road area. You may have seen a helicopter with a large loop flying around the week of March 12-19. This is a new company and they are in the process of raising more capital to fund ongoing exploration work.

**MNDM** - Rogan Harpur and Jennifer Simpson explained the meaning and purpose to the information the MNDM collects and compiles for mining companies and individuals to use in the search for economic mineral deposits. The MNDM resident geologist Peter Chadwick was introduced by Rogan Harpur. In the near future the TFN will meet with Mr. Chadwick to discuss mineral deposits on nDaki Menan in detail. Mr. Chadwick is based in Kirkland Lake.

**NEW AGE METALS** – Trevor Richardson President and CEO gave a historical account and an overview of the platinum and palladium River Valley Project and the growing resource there. The mineralized zones were recently expanded to 3.9 million ounces and they are getting set to do a prefeasibility study to see if the economics of the project are good enough to go into an open pit mining operation. The project has been underway since 1998. Platinum and palladium are used in the auto industry.

**CASTLE SILVER MINES** – Frank Basa - president and CEO and Diane Tookenay – Liason representative attended. Frank had to leave due to an illness in

the family and Diane presented on behalf of Frank. Diane's presentation focused on cobalt (the metal) at their Castle Mine Project. Apparently there is a strong demand for cobalt now and when the silver was mined there cobalt was considered waste. Diane showed an interesting video of Frank inside and underground at the minesite. Large quartz veins could be seen with an abundance of cobalt bloom (purple in colour). They are excited of the prospect of developing this cobalt resource but are in the early stages of exploration still.

**CHIEF PAUL** gave a report on his experiences at the PDAC conference 2018. He attended along with Doug McKenzie and myself. We ran into Randy Becker there promoting Nimkie Mining. The conference was very busy with meetings every day with mining companies. The value of attending these functions to network became very apparent as the group attended workshops and had business breakfast and lunches. He can see how the youth can be involved in attending a conference like the PDAC.

**DOUG'S RETIREMENT DINNER** Sixty people enjoyed an awesome ham and beans and moose stew dinner prepared by Ann and team. Thank you very much Ann.

Doug was recognized for his accomplishments and long standing tenure with the TFN in many different job positions. He has worked for the TFN since the 70's. That's a long time! Congratulations Doug. There were many heartfelt speeches from community members telling of their experiences working with Doug. It sure was good to hear those stories. TFN gifted him a "top of the line" golf driver so he can hit the ball out of the park. Doug also received numerous gifts from mining companies like a golf cap and a putter. Community members showed their appreciation for Doug's dedication to his people with gifts and well wishes as he becomes a world traveler to Europe to kick off that phase of a life well-lived. Good luck Doug and keep that ball between the trees!


